



Grove Road junction

An earlier scheme to improve safety and tackle inconsiderate parking on Sea Road was rejected by residents. Now, the Town Hall has agreed to make the junction a pedestrian controlled crossing instead.



Belvidere Centre

A petition for improved road safety near the Belvidere Centre and allotments on Belvidere Road has been signed by 100 people. Councillor Ian Lewis has met with the Council's Road Safety Manager to come up with ideas.



Mosslands Drive

Our petition to have Mosslands Drive resurfaced was signed by more than 100 residents. The Town Hall agreed that the road needs repair. A new product called 'durapatch' is being tried out by the Council and, if it works, it will be used here.



Wallasey Village station

In spite of money being made available by the Government, Merseytravel refused to include Wallasey Village Station in a bid for improved access. Your councillors have now written to the Transport Secretary asking him to intervene.



Wallacre Play area

Thank you to all those mums and dads who took part in our survey about the improvements they would like to see in our children's play areas. Following the survey, the Town Hall agreed to spend £15,000 on Wallacre Play area.



Leasowe Road junction

Last year, following concerns by residents, Ian, Lesley and Paul met with the council managers to request the current lights be 're-phased' to allow more traffic to turn into Cross Lane and Greenleas Road. We are now pushing for new filter lights.

Protecting our environment:

Ian, Lesley and Paul do not support building on Wirral's Green Belt.

We will work with residents to maintain and improve our green and open spaces.



2

Tackling Town Hall waste:

Since Labour lost control of the Council, we've scrapped the Wirral View newspaper.

Loans to other councils have stopped and we are reducing the amount spent on consultants and senior directors.

3

Improving council services:

Roads and pavements, parks and streetlights, dog fouling and bins: these are the issues residents raise the most.

New streetlights are finally on the way and we'll push for more road and pavement repairs and a plan to tackle dog fouling.

4

Putting more police on the streets:

With 20,000 extra police being recruited nationally, it's important for Wallasey to receive a fair share to help deter and detect crime in Wallasey.

Lesley, as a former local police officer, along with Ian and Paul will lobby for extra police in Wallasey. Nationally, we're creating 10,000 more prison places.

Supporting local shops and town centres:

We believe that, for too long, Birkenhead has been the priority for the Council. Local shopping areas, such as Liscard and Wallasey Village need help too.

We will work with all parties for a plan to reverse the decline in Liscard, using money that is being provided by the Government.


Planting new trees in Wallasey:

Following Ian's action, the Council has submitted a plan and, at the time of this leaflet going to print, a decision was imminent.

That's one of the reasons why even people who support other parties in General Elections, lend us their vote locally.

One of our biggest campaigns in 2019 was to have the popular Post Office in Wallasey Village re-opened.

This was one of several post offices that had been closed by the national Post Office, after problems with their accounting system.

Following our petition signed by more than 1,000 residents, the Post Office was re-opened.

We also contacted a Government Minister in the issue.

As we reported on our Facebook page, compensation is now being paid to local Post Office managers.



Thank you to those residents who supported the campaign by Ian, Lesley and Paul to have the Post Office re-opened.

The poor condition of many of our local roads and pavements, streetlights and trees were the top issues raised by residents during 2019.

Following action by Ian, Lesley and Paul, Grove Road was finally resurfaced in October and we organised a petition for Mosslands Drive.

We submitted a further list of roads and pavements that need attention, following our survey of residents. New street lights are also finally being installed. We also asked the Town Hall to bid for money for new trees.


Grove Road was finally resurfaced. Ian, Lesley and Paul have submitted a list for 2020.



The Warren Golf Course will now benefit from new investment by the Town Hall, following work by club members and your councillors.

During the summer, Labour Councillors announced they would continue with plans to privatise the Borough's four council-owned golf courses, including The Warren here in Wallasey.

Your three councillors Ian, Lesley and Paul worked with members of the clubs based at The Warren. After a series of meetings, the privatisation plan was dropped.

Instead, the Council will now produce a five-year investment plan for all four courses.

Back in 2004, Wirral's Council housing was transferred to a new landlord, who promised improved repairs and maintenance. Sadly, residents of the former council flats in Wallasey Village were still waiting, 15 years later.

Following meetings with residents and councillors, including Councillor Lesley Rennie, a programme of improvements to the communal areas was finally agreed. This work has now been completed.
