Have you heard about the changes to voting in May?

Steve, Ian and Lesley are working on local issues here in Wallasey.

We called to see you today to ask if there are any problems or issues in your road that we can help with.

We think the job of a local councillor isn't just about sitting in meetings at the Town Hall. We believe what matters more is to be out and about,

listening to residents, all year round and not just at election time.

Some of the local issues we are working on include:

- Pushing for lifts to be installed at Wallasey Village Station
- Working to save and protect local green spaces
- Tackling illegal encampments at The Dips.

Who works hardest?

Local Conservative councillors **97**

Labour Councillors **35**

The latest figures published by Wirral Council show that each of your three local Conservative councillors raised an average of 97 issues for action since the May 2022 elections. Meanwhile, the five Labour councillors in nearby Liscard and Leasowe managed just 35 issues over the same period.

Help to improve road safety

One of the top issues raised with us by residents is road safety.

Community Speedwatch is one of the initiatives being used by the police to help. Working together, residents and police record details of speeding vehicles using approved detection devices.

We put our community first

Locally, we have to work hard, all year round, to gain and keep the trust and support of residents for our work in this community. We never take it for granted.

At the moment, the opinion polls suggest that Labour will have a majority in the Town Hall at the council elections. That's why your vote here in Wallasey matters. Our community needs councillors who are prepared to challenge poor decisions in the Town Hall.

You'll have 3 votes for 3 councillors in May...

The council elections this year are the last until 2027. That means that instead of electing one councillor, people in Wallasey will be asked to vote for the team.

By voting for your three councillors at the same time, it means you will be able to keep the team that works hardest for your vote, and our community, all year round.

With Labour being the biggest party in the Council, as well as having the MP, the Police Commissioner and the Metro Mayor, it's important to have people representing you that will challenge their sometimes poor decisions and speak up.

The last time Labour had councillors here in Wallasey, that didn't happen - they weren't seen and local issues were neglected.



Only by using all THREE of your votes to elect your THREE local councillors will you keep the team that works hardest for Wallasey.

...and you'll need to take ID when you vote

If you're one of the 8,842 people in this area who don't vote by post, then please read on!

From this year you will be

asked to take a form of identification with you. This includes things like a:

- photo bus pass
- passport
- driving licence

If you don't have an acceptable form of photo ID, or are unsure about the kind of ID required, the Council's Elections Team can help - you can contact them on 0151 691 8046 or email elections@wirral.gov.uk

You can also contact them if you would prefer to vote by post instead.



A bus pass, driving licence or passport can be used to prove who you are when you vote.

our plan

for tackling local issues in Wallasey

1 Supporting our local library service.
We've helped to set up the group that is going to reopen Wallasey Village Library. We also support keeping Wallasey Central Library.

4 Speaking up for our community in the Town Hall.
We will challenge Labour Councillors when we think they are making the wrong decisions or not spending your money wisely.

2 Protecting our green spaces and local Green Belt.
We've ensured more green spaces in Wallasey will be protected in the long-awaited Local Plan. We work closely with friends groups in our local parks.

5 Supporting residents with the cost of living.
We'll do this by helping residents who are eligible for extra support, to receive it - whether for energy bills or things like Pension Credit.

3 Improve bus and train services.
We'll continue our campaign for lifts to be installed at Wallasey Village Station. We secured the reintroduction of the 106/107 bus service.

6 Improving road safety at crash hotspots.
We'll prioritise those locations such as Leasowe Road/Cross Lane with poor safety records and areas around our local schools.
